Home Words for Heart and Hearth

This month marks the 150th anniversary of the first Parish magazine in Brayton Parish. In January 1875, the Revd. Robert Jarratt Crosthwaite, vicar of St Wilfrid's between 1874 and 1883, opened the first edition with a letter 'To the Inhabitants of the Parish of Brayton' – reproduced on the next page.

This Parish magazine followed the format of *Home Words*, a publication created in 1871 by the Revd. Charles Bullock, Rector of St Nicholas, Worcester. Bullock was the author of many books and periodicals. His first magazine was The Fireside (first published in 1864), but *Home Words* was the first to be published nationally, yet including local interest; as such, local advertisements and features written by the local clergy were inserted into the national edition. Readership increased rapidly, from 90,000 a month after just one year of publication. Four years later it was 250,000 a month, and by 1964 it had reached a peak of over 1m copies per month!

It is difficult now to understand the impact that *Home Words* had on Victorian society. In an age when the general population of Britain was only just becoming literate, Bullock's offer of parochial religious reading material to the working classes was revolutionary. It also built upon the example of Charles Dickens' publication of novels in serial form: the phenomenally popular The Pickwick Papers had been published monthly between March 1836 and November 1837.

Bullock supported working class advancement through literature and book ownership. The content of *Home Words* was designed to interest, entertain and educate- all good Victorian values – religious articles interspersed with bitesized advice, proverbs and adverts (see below). These were easy to read and more appealing to consumers.

St Wilfrid's has a library of Home Words and later Parish Magazines, which I am assured is complete. Speak to the PCC if you would like to view any edition.

My DEAR FRIENDS'-

I wish to introduce to you the first number for 1875 of "Home Words for Heart and Hearth." I propose, if you give it a kindly welcome, to adopt it as our Parish Magazine. It will be issued monthly. The price, if a sufficient number of copies are taken, will be one penny. Each number will be delivered early in the month at your own houses.

You will see that the body of the Magazine is intended for general circulation; and I may observe that as many as 180,000 copies were sold monthly last year in various parishes in England. The cover will be printed specially for the parish of Brayton, and will contain notices of matters of interest to the parishioners. For example, we shall print here notices of Baptisms, Marriages, and Burials; announcements of Special Services, Sermons, and Collections in church; the Reports of the Inspectors of Schools; and other matters of a similar kind.

Several reasons have led me to wish to introduce a Parish Magazine :

I. It will supply a publication containing wholesome, entertaining, and useful matter, at a price within the reach of all.

II. It will be useful to me as a means of communication with my parishioners on subjects on which from time to time I may wish to give them information, or to express my opinion.

III. It will, I hope, be of some service as a means of promoting the interest of the different parts of our large parish in each other and in the general welfare of the whole.

IV. The institution of such a Magazine has been found useful in other parishes; and I believe that it will give pleasure to many of you.

In conclusion, as this is the January number, allow me to wish you all most heartily "A Happy New Year." May we enjoy God's blessing richly this year; and may we give to Him a large return of thankfulness and love!

Saint Máedóc of Ferns

When I called at an elderly lady's home to take her to a lunch club run by my church her normal calm and happy nature had been disturbed by a scam text message she had received. The sender claimed to be her son who was in urgent need of some money because his phone was broken. Fortunately, she became suspicious because the phrasing of the message did not sound like her son, so she wisely rang his supposedly 'broken' phone and uncovered the scam. Nevertheless, the whole experience had clearly upset her, so it was fortunate I turned up to reassure her that she had done the right thing.

As Christians this type of experience is always going to present us with a dilemma. Do we follow the teaching of Jesus who, according to the Gospel of Matthew, said: 'Give to the one who begs from you, and do not refuse the one who would borrow from you', or do we walk away telling ourselves that we support other charities, and they will use the money more wisely?

I can't help being reminded of a story about C S Lewis who was walking past a street beggar with a friend. He stopped and gave the beggar his loose change while his friend walked on. When they got together again his friend said, 'the beggar will only spend it on ale'. To which C S Lewis replied, 'that's what I would have spent it on as well!'

Knowing what to do in such circumstances can be difficult. A few years ago, a destitute couple knocked on my door saying they had been referred to me by someone I knew. I also knew that this person was



moving house that day and could not be contacted. To cut a long story short, my wife and I fed them, gave them clean clothes, let them have a shower, and bought them a tent to sleep in while they sorted out their finances and somewhere to live. But they kept coming back. I realised a few weeks later when I was taking them to a shop to buy food for them that I was being scammed - four police cars with sirens blaring penned me in and dragged them out of my car. My 'beggars' turned out to be terrorists and that experience has led me to be more wary of dealing direct with street beggars but to help them through supporting registered local charities.

Ascertaining the true status of a street beggar has never been easy, The Irish saint, Máedóc of Ferns – also called Saint Aidan or Saint Mogue – is celebrated on the last of day of this month. He died on 31 January 632 AD. While he was known for his self-denial, holiness, and charity, he was also wise to fraudsters who even then, nearly 1,400 years ago, would try to scam other people.

One day some fraudsters turned up at his monastery having hidden their fine clothes and replaced them with dirty rags. They asked Máedóc to help them to buy some new clothes but first Máedóc checked them out. He found their hidden clothes and gave them to some genuine beggars outside the monastery and sent the fraudsters away in their rags!

The lesson we can all learn from Saint Máedóc, the lady I give lifts to, and, indeed, my own mistakes, is to always check out what the real situation is before being too generous, and if you are still unsure about someone's honesty, direct them to an appropriate charity that you support


Martin Pearson did a superb job as service leader and we all listened to his thoughtful interlude about the meaning of Christmas and joined to sing Our God is a great big God.



What's the Big Idea - Acts



The Acts of the Apostles was written by Luke, a physician-friend and fellow-traveller of Paul. It complements his gospel, both being written for Theophilus (Luke 1:3; Acts 1:1), in around AD 63, during Paul's first Roman imprisonment.

While Luke's gospel records what Jesus began to do and teach, Acts tells us about what Jesus continued to do and teach through the disciples, empowered by the Holy Spirit (1:1-3).

Luke's aim is:

 To present a history. Christianity has a firm historical foundation. The life and teaching of Jesus Christ are recorded in the Gospels; Acts provides an account of the spread of the Church, as the result of the work of the risen Lord and the Holy Spirit through the apostles.

- To give a defense. We read speeches to both Jews (eg 4:8–12) and Gentiles (eg 25:8–11), showing us how the Early Church challenged pagan and Jewish thought, the Roman government and Hellenistic culture.
- 3. To provide a guide. We see basic gospel principles being applied to specific situations in the context of problems and persecution. These same principles are applicable for us today.
- 4. To depict the triumph of Christianity in the face of bitter persecution. The success of the Church carrying the gospel from

Jerusalem to Rome and planting local churches demonstrates that it operates under the rule of the exalted Christ and through the power of the Holy Spirit.

'But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be My witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.' (1:8). Just as the Holy Spirit empowered the first Christians in their witness, so He will do the same for us today!

NEWS from YOUR Parochial Church Council (PCC)

This is an update from our last meeting which was held on Wednesday 27th November 2024. The PCC meets again on Wednesday 15th January 2025 @7pm in the Parish Hall (*see below)

PCC membership

We were pleased to welcome Sue Beevers to the PCC. Sue was Co-opted and will be formally elected at the APCM in April 2025. If you would be interested in joining the PCC or want to find out more, please contact Ruth Breeze or another member of the PCC.

Annual Review of Safeguarding Policies

Linda Bunn, the Parish Safeguarding Representative, presented 7 Policies for the PCC to review, amend if appropriate, and agree. The 7 Policies will be displayed on the Church Notice Board and the Parish Website. **Finance**

Mrs. J Clarke advised the meeting that the draft Budget for 2025 showed a significant overspend, using the current rates of income and anticipated expenditure, and expressed her concerns re the decline in Planned Giving. Discussion took place about various income streams and outgoings. This included holding an Annual Generosity Event/Service, increasing Planned Giving, and encouraging donating towards the costs at Baptisms. The PCC were made aware that St Wilfrid's does not charge for Baptisms yet have an outlay for Baptism Cards etc. and that we might wish to consider taking a collection during the service. Many people who attend church are not aware how much it costs to run the Church.

The PCC acknowledged the contribution made by the Social and Events Committee, Craft Group and those involved with the Autumn/Spring Fairs to church funds.

Rector Vacancy

There was a lot of discussion about the way forward, in terms of recruiting a new Incumbent and how we manage the current situation. The meeting on Wednesday 15th January 2025 will be open to any/all interested people to discuss **WHAT IS ESSENTIAL, WHAT WOULD BE NICE TO DO, WHAT WE CAN DO and HOW.** If you are interested

in being part of this discussion on 15th January and/or helping to take things forward in the Church, please let Ruth know.

STOP PRESS – Since the meeting we have been informed by Archdeacon Sam that an interest has been expressed in the vacancy and arrangements are now being made to take this application forward.

In the meantime, we continue to rely on the support of our retired clergy. Several members of the Church have also taken on extra responsibilities, requiring a lot of time and effort. Our thanks go out to them all. Please support these people as much as possible and be mindful that there will be some changes to services due to availability of clergy going forward until our new Rector is in post..

On behalf of the Trustees of Swaziland Schools Projects, may I thank you for the wonderful donation of ± 525 from the Brayton PCC. Your support over many years is very much appreciated.

So, what is the charity doing at present?

Our builders are just completing the renovation of Lundzi Primary School. It is a remote school in a very poor area, and we are renovating the 18 classrooms. This includes installing false ceilings and lighting. We do this because otherwise the tin roofs make classrooms very hot in summer and very cold in winter. Also, when it rains, the pupils struggle to hear the teacher. Mending windows and doors and concreting holes in the floors will also take place.

Other work on the site is taking place and we will complete our work there by buying furniture and teaching resources.

We are also about to send about $\pounds 12,000$ so that 34 children – mainly girls – can receive a secondary education. The cost is about $\pounds 400$ per pupil, and this covers the fees, food and uniform.

So, your donation is very timely and will help us meet the 12k target. Please pass my best wishes onto everyone – I'm still hoping to come and see you all at some point. Best wishes
